

BPS Social Studies 20 Week Elective: History of the Erie Canal



Course Overview:

In this course we will discover why the Erie Canal was considered America's 1st Highway System. To achieve a comprehensive understanding of the impact that the "Grand Canal" had on both the fortunes of New York State and the United States we will analyze and interpret many dynamic primary and secondary sources related to the Erie Canal, what was at the time disapprovingly called "Clinton's Ditch" or 'Clinton's Folly". As we shall discover with our analysis, history would quickly prove NYS Gov. DeWitt Clinton correct in his enormous task of uniting the Atlantic Seaboard with the Midwest by a man made waterway called by some historians the "Grand Canal". This passage from noted Buffalo Historian Mark Goldman succinctly summarizes the impact of the Erie Canal:

The completion of the Erie Canal will do more to facilitate the development of the American West than any single act since Jefferson's purchase of the Louisiana Territory. It will just be a question of time before the territories and states in the American Midwest - Ohio, Indiana, Illinois, Wisconsin - suddenly enjoying enormous population gains, will begin to ship agricultural produce eastward. When that happens, Buffalo will become the great port of trans-shipment. Meanwhile, as hundreds of thousands of people abandon the East Coast for the Midwest, they invariably pass through Buffalo.
